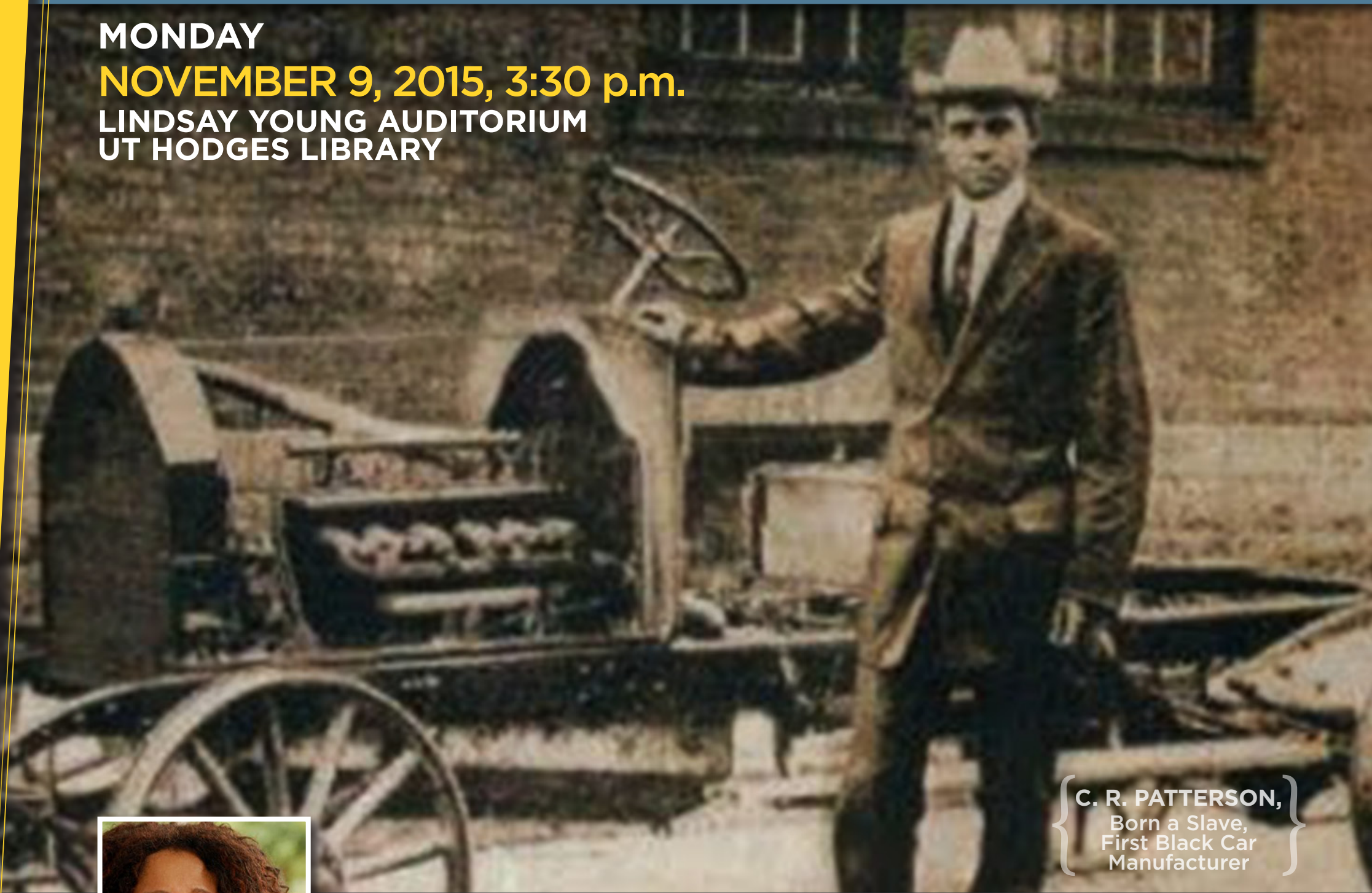

JULIET E. K. WALKER is professor of history and the founder and director of the Center for Black Business History, Entrepreneurship and Technology at the University of Texas at Austin.

Through cutting-edge scholarship, Walker has been recognized as the foremost authority on African American business history in the United States. Her groundbreaking book, *The History of Black Business in America: Capitalism, Race, Entrepreneurship* (1998) is the most comprehensive study on the contributions of black Americans to capitalism. Walker's lecture will trace the history of black capitalism beginning with pre-colonial African American business culture to the present.
